All these facts in addition to Stevenson's „passionate aim 'to find a body, a vehicle for that strong sense of man's double being' which he had felt as a student in Edinburgh when he dreamed of leading 'a double life - one of the day, one of the night'" may have been his inspirations which culminated in the writing of the novel (Stevenson quoted in op. cit.:191).
