1. **WELLNESS CHALLENGES AND TEAM ACTIVITIES:** FOSTER A CULTURE OF WELLNESS THROUGH FUN AND ENGAGING ACTIVITIES. ORGANIZE TEAM SPORTS, WALKING GROUPS, OR WELLNESS CHALLENGES TO ENCOURAGE PARTICIPATION AND TEAMWORK.
