A slave named Jerry whom Twain referred to as an impudent and satirical and delightful young black man taught Twain about signifying--satire in an African-American vein--when Twain was a teenager (later Twain would recall that he thought him the greatest man in the United States at the time). Other African-American voices left their mark on Twain's imagination as well--but their role in the creation of his art has never been recognized. *Was Huck Black?* adds a new dimension to current debates over multiculturalism and the canon.
