Others seem to think that the analogies drawn are justified because they accentuate McCandless' transcendentalist qualities and provide an accurate depiction of his moral nature and idealism. In a broad sense, the term intertextuality can be defined as the study of a presence of a text within another text and it is most often employed in literary analysis.
