Nowadays it is common knowledge that Edgar Allan Poe is one of the most famous representatives when it comes to the involvement of personal experiences and the placement of hidden symbols in short stories and poems. *The Masque of the Red Death* is no exception and also represents one of Poe's most popular tales.
