Sharing similarities with *The Hunger Games*, starring Jennifer Lawrence, this is the story that created the template for pitting man against man. Born in New York, Richard Connell (1893 – 1949) went on to become an acclaimed author, screenwriter, and journalist. He is best remembered for the gripping novel *The Most Dangerous Game* and for receiving an Oscar nomination for the screenplay *Meet John Doe*.
