THE JUXTAPOSITION OF THESE IMAGES FORCES THE READER TO CONFRONT THE ABSURDITY AND HARM INFLICTED BY CHASING AN IMPOSSIBLE STANDARD OF BEAUTY.

### III. DECONSTRUCTING GENDER ROLES: A CRITIQUE OF PATRIARCHY

"BARBIE DOLL" ISN'T JUST A CRITIQUE OF GENDER; IT'S ALSO A POIGNANT COMMENTARY ON THE AMERICAN DREAM'S INHERENT CONTRADICTIONS.
