However, many critics argue that Marlowe's Dr. Faustus owes a lot to the medieval dramatic tradition, to be precise, to the morality play tradition. Describing different types of the medieval plays, Philip Tilling claims that "the morality play as a kind of medieval religious play arose alongside the mystery play and was to continue, in modified form, throughout the Elizabethan period, culminating in Marlowe's Faustus." So, Tilling considers Dr. Faustus to be "a morality play in a modified form". In my paper I see Dr. Faustus as a Renaissance tragedy which was to a certain degree influenced by the medieval dramatic tradition and has some characteristic features of the morality play.
