And why is he the first person the police suspect when she is found dead in Arizona a few days later? Dorothy B. Hughes ranks with Raymond Chandler and Patricia Highsmith as a master of mid-century noir. In books like *In a Lonely Place* and *Ride the Pink Horse* she exposed a seething discontent underneath the veneer of twentieth-century prosperity. With *The Expendable Man*, first published in 1963, Hughes upends the conventions of

the wrong-man narrative to deliver a story that engages readers even as it implicates them in the greatest of all American crimes.
