THIS INCREDIBLE BIODIVERSITY IS A TESTAMENT TO THE REGION'S RICH ECOSYSTEMS AND ITS UNIQUE GEOLOGICAL HISTORY.

EXPLORING KEY HABITATS AND THEIR AVIAN INHABITANTS

UNDERSTANDING THE HABITATS IS KEY TO APPRECIATING THE DIVERSITY OF BIRDS OF THE INDIAN SUBCONTINENT. LET'S EXPLORE SOME KEY AREAS:

THE HIMALAYAS: A HIGH-ALTITUDE HAVEN

THESE BIRDS OFTEN BOAST STRIKING PLUMAGE, A TESTAMENT TO THEIR UNIQUE EVOLUTIONARY JOURNEY IN THIS CHALLENGING ENVIRONMENT.

THE INDIAN PLAINS: A VAST AND VARIED LANDSCAPE

FROM GRASSLANDS TO AGRICULTURAL FIELDS, THE VAST INDIAN PLAINS SUPPORT A REMARKABLE RANGE OF BIRD SPECIES. PEAFOWL, PAINTED STORKS, AND VARIOUS SPECIES OF EAGLES AND VULTURES ARE COMMON SIGHTS. THESE PLAINS ARE ALSO CRUCIAL MIGRATORY ROUTES FOR MANY SPECIES, MAKING THEM HOTSPOTS FOR BIRDWATCHERS.

THE WESTERN GHATS: BIODIVERSITY HOTSPOT

THIS MOUNTAIN RANGE RUNNING ALONG INDIA'S WESTERN COAST IS A BIODIVERSITY HOTSPOT, HOME TO NUMEROUS ENDEMIC BIRD SPECIES FOUND NOWHERE ELSE ON EARTH. THE RICH FORESTS OF THE WESTERN GHATS PROVIDE SHELTER FOR A VARIETY OF COLOURFUL BIRDS LIKE MALABAR TROGONS, LAUGHINGTHRUSHES, AND THE ENDANGERED NILGIRI WOOD PIGEON.

COASTAL REGIONS AND MANGROVES: A COASTAL KALEIDOSCOPE

INDIA'S EXTENSIVE COASTLINE AND MANGROVE FORESTS ARE HAVENS FOR VARIOUS WATER BIRDS. FLAMINGOS, PELICANS, KINGFISHERS, AND TERNS GRACE THE SHORES, ADDING A SPLASH OF VIBRANT COLOUR TO THE COASTAL LANDSCAPE. THESE HABITATS ARE CRUCIAL FOR MANY MIGRATORY SPECIES THAT RELY ON THESE AREAS FOR RESTING AND FEEDING.

CONSERVATION CHALLENGES AND EFFORTS
